The journey which brought us here has been complicated; you might say our path has been "circular". But, the time it took to get here seems to have gone by in a flash! Sharon was born in Washington DC. Her family moved to Olympia when she was 7 years old. She graduated from Olympia HS; attended Centralia College; and Edison Technical School in Seattle where she received her LPN Certification. She worked in Seattle at Northwest Hospital while we lived in Seattle.

Ted was born in Billings, Montana and lived in Montana and Wyoming for his first 12 years. His family moved to Longview where Ted graduated from Mark Morris HS. He graduated from Centralia College; and from the University of Washington (Seattle) in 1968 with a BS in Electrical Engineering, focusing on Computer Engineering. Ted worked at the UW Aeronautical Lab in charge of the wind tunnel during those school years.



As you probably figured out; we met at Centralia College. We both lived in Olympia and rode the College Commuter bus; where we first met. PASTOR'S LOG

My uncle, Gary Brown, was diagnosed with lung cancer a few years ago and just recently he passed away as a result of it. Whenever a loved one of ours dies one of the things we think about is life after death. Is there really life after death? If so, what's it like? Where is it? Or maybe do we just simply die and cease to exist anymore? Wouldn't it be nice to know for certain?

When I had gotten word that he had passed away I made the trip down to Orting, WA to see his wife and my Dad's side of the family who had flown in from the south. We sat around and shared stories about good Gary, ate together, and even watched the Seahawks win a football game. He would have enjoyed all of that.



Later in the afternoon just as the sun was setting we noticed that there was a spectacular sunset so we went out to get a better view. When we got to the road where we could see better one of the brightest double rainbows I had ever seen appeared seemingly out of nowhere. I took the picture you see here of it. We all were amazed by the sign that we felt like we were getting. Gary was not dead but alive, and God's beautiful rainbow in the sky was a sign to us that both God and Gary were present with us.

Over the years I've heard countless stories of people who have received incredible signs that their loved ones who had passed were alive with God. Maybe you've experienced or heard things like this as well. Then there are those who have had near death experiences and have come back from the afterlife to tell about it.

The story of Jesus' death and resurrection, which we celebrate especially at Easter, truly is a story that should give all of us hope that life continues even after death has taken hold of us. For as Jesus said, "When I go to prepare a place for you, I will return and take you to be with me so that where I am you will be too". Jesus' death and resurrection is a miraculous sign for those of us who believe that death is not the end. In-

stead it becomes the transition from being 'here' (wherever here is?) to being 'there' with Jesus (wherever there is?).

In the book study we are doing for Souper Wednesdays right now, the author writes about how Jesus says to the one next to him on the cross, "truly I tell you, today you will be with me in paradise". She goes on to explain that

maybe what's important about this is not that Jesus defines what paradise is, but rather that Jesus promises the one being crucified with him that he will be with Jesus. In other words, maybe the most important thing about life after death is who we will be with. Our Christian faith teaches us that we will be with Jesus, and since there's not more than one Jesus we will also be with one another. Maybe what's most important about heaven is not whether there are streets of gold or not, but that we will be with God forever together.

Happy Easter! Jesus is alive! Our loved ones are with him today! One day we will be as well!

graduated from UW he accepted a job with IBM in San Jose, CA. We moved there in April of 1968. In 1971 and 1973 we added our daughters, Megan and Melissa, to round out our family. (Yes, we did get carried away with the M's in naming our children!) We lived just south of San Jose in Morgan Hill where Ted designed and built (personally, from scratch) our first home. We lived there for about 6 years. Ted was involved in developing very complex computer systems and was spending a lot of time with IBM in Boulder, CO. So in 1974 we decided to move there. We enjoyed Colorado; living on a small 12 acre farm northeast of Longmont. In 1979 IBM asked us to move to Tucson to a new IBM plant. We didn't want to move into that Arizona heat, so we chose to leave IBM and move to Boise, Idaho to work for Hewlett Packard. We bought 40 acres of undeveloped farm land outside of Boise in Kuna, Idaho. And once again, Ted designed and built our home from the ground up. The farm work and construction work balanced out the engineering environment where progress was sometimes hard to detect. Sharon didn't want to transfer her LPN certification so she became a substitute teacher in our children's schools... until they hit High School and the kids objected to mom being everywhere they were.

In 1984 Ted and several friends left HP and started their own computer accessories company: Extended Systems. Our electronic products allowed companies to share their new LaserJet printers with many other people to offset the cost of the printers. Sharon worked at the company as did several of the kids. It was scary and exciting and allowed us all to expand our scope of experience.

As a family we traveled with our children wherever we lived. We loved camping in Colorado and Wyoming. We also spent a lot of time on the road when they were young driving to Olympia for Thanksgiving or Christmas since both of our families lived there. (We drove through lots of blizzards across Wyoming, Idaho and Oregon.) After our kids left home we started trav-

eling for fun. In fact, our first year (1995) we did a mission trip to Honduras to help build a church; we received a refugee family from Zaire (Congo) that lived with us for several months while we helped them get settled; and we took a late fall trip to Europe. That trip to Europe was compelling and we've traveled to many different areas, enjoying everything. Sharon's maiden name is O'Neil, so you can imagine how much she enjoyed Ireland. In fact, so much we took a later trip back to Ireland with her O'Neil siblings!

The little town of Kuna that we lived in and loved for 43 years has become a booming town with lots of housing developments surrounding our farm. So, several years ago we decided we should think about moving. We decided we'd return to Washington and Port Townsend seemed right. Once we made that decision, Sharon had all the household belongings packed and stacked about a year before we actually moved. We were fortunate to find a nice home in the tight market of Port Townsend. Sadly, we moved away from our 3 older, mostly grown grandchildren and our older daughter in Boise.

Over the years we have been involved with lots of different church activities. We attended and were involved in the Kuna UMC. So, we were very happy when a former Pastor and friend (Rev. Karen) told us about Trinity UMC before we moved here. She hadn't visited the church but she had met and was impressed with Pastor Tony at the Oregon/Idaho PNW combined Annual Conferences. She knows us pretty well and she figured we would probably like it here. We have been received with open arms and friendly faces in Trinity. Thank you all for your hospitality.

Random tidbits about us you might not guess: As a youth Sharon was on the Olympia YMCA swim team and remembers swim meet competitions up this way in Bremerton and Sequim. At 17 Ted was a Y-Camp counselor at Spirit Lake below Mt St Helens and climbed the mountain 18 years before it blew.

An Evening of Classical/Neo-Classical/Finger-Style Guitar Playing

Trinity United Methodist's Candlelight Concerts hosts Joe Euro, a "Classical/Neo-

Classical Finger-Style" guitarist, who will be performing

at Trinity United Methodist Church on Thursday, April 27 2023, at 7:00 PM for one set with no intermission.

The performance will also be streamed live at https://trinityumcpt.org/concerts/

where you will find a link for the Candlelight Concerts Online and ways to donate. The concert will also be simulcast on KPTZ FM 91.9.

Admission is free, with a suggested donation \$15 per person. Half of the donation proceeds from this concert will go to Joe Euro's chosen charity, <u>Habitat for Humanity</u>, <u>East Jefferson County</u>, whose mission is "Seeking


to put God's love into action, Habitat for Humanity brings people together to build homes, communities and hope."

Trinity United Methodist Church is located at 609 Taylor Street, across from the Community Center, in Uptown. Attendees should plan on arriving early – doors

will open at 6:30. Masks are required for in-person attendees.

This Joe Euro Candlelight Concert performance will

feature Acoustic, Instrumen-"Neo-Classical"/"Finger Guitar, highlighting Style" of Euro's "Neomany Classical" original compositions and some actual Classical Guitar pieces, "plucked from the Classical Guitar Repertoire." Mr. Euro is often referred to as a "Classical Guitarist" but Joe explains that he neither has the time or the discipline to stay on top of that repertoire. And besides, after learning classical guitar techniques over the years, he is more motivated to play his "neoclassical" pieces, and arrangements often composed by him, and often utilizing a few different "open tunings."



Joe makes a tentative "set list" for his performance but prefers to be able to "go rogue" and deviate from that, should the spirit move.

Some of Mr. Euro's set may also include arrangements of some lite jazz standards, and most likely a few (Continued on next page)

"covers", and last, but not least, a bit of his "Ambient Space Guitar" pieces utilizing a digital reverb and a volume pedal, to draw down all that "Taj Mahal"-like reverb. This is a sound he enjoyed developing and experimenting with when he moved to this area back in 1979 and would bring his guitar into the bunkers at Fort Flagler. Joe also was able to get into the "Cistern" at Fort Worden, which also inspired him to use this "Big Spacey Sound" which is now accessible with some of Euro's "guitarsenal" of various guitars and "gizmology."

Euro's "day job", The Wine Seller, was founded by him in 1982. It is one of Washington's State's oldest and finest wine/bottle shops, located on Water St. "downtown" Port Townsend. Besides wine and music, Joe loves to travel. He has hosted and guided many European and one South American "Small Group Journeys" and is still filling the last few spaces for his next Small Group Journey to Spain from September 26th – October 6th, 2023.

FINANCE COMMITTEE

This is the Best Start to a Trinity Budget year in the past 10 Years!! Our Operating cash flow remains financially solid due to the fulfillment of "lump sum" annual pledges by several Trinity congregants. This totals \$32,740 YTD. We are at 98% of payments on monthly EOG's to date and we have received \$19,000 of non EOGs. This puts us in a healthy place at this time remembering that we made deep cuts to create this budget.

Through February our annualized income (EOGs, Cash Donations, Rent, etc.) is at 123% of Budget. THANK YOU TRINITY!! Our expenses thru February are right on target at 101% - just \$500 over budget. This includes the high cost of oil, cost of utilities and winter fuel oil. It also includes several extraordinary expense such as our music copyright license for Candlelight Concerts/Sanctuary music performances.

What also keeps us healthy are the hundreds of monthly volunteer hours keeping our church clean, managing the upkeep and maintenance of our building, keeping supplies stocked, beautiful music filling our hearts and in all of this the joy of working and making it happen TOGETHER. God Bless you all.


