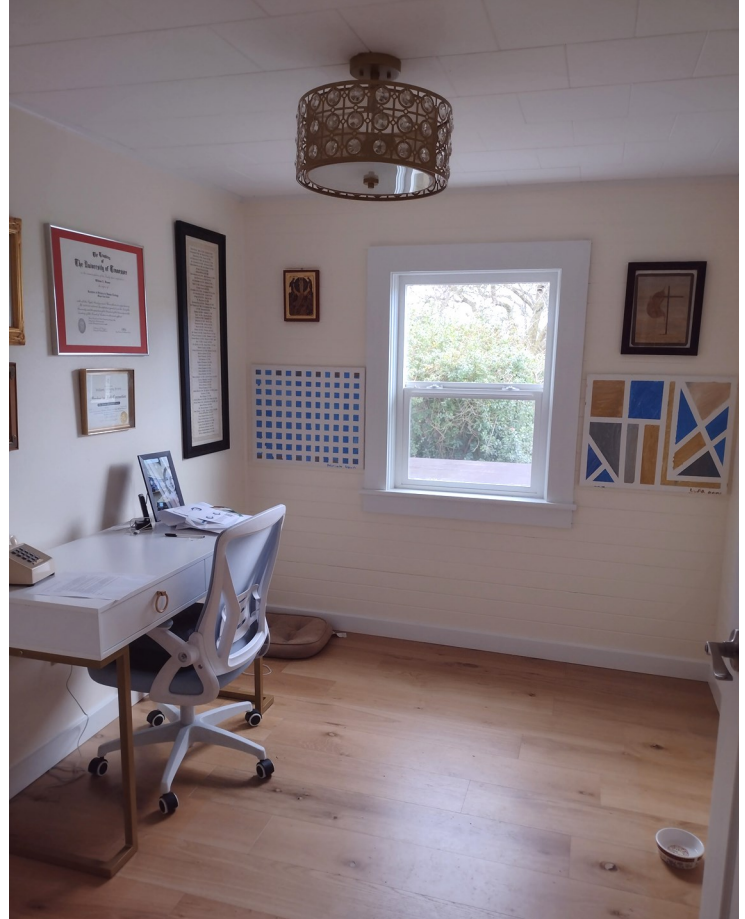

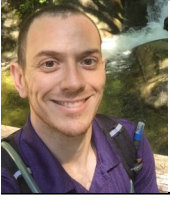

PASTOR'S LOG

Dear Church,

I recently sent an email out about a need for helpers on Sunday mornings to work with the children. If you were at church on March 30th you saw that we had 3 young children. As you probably are aware it can be difficult as a parent and even embarrassing to sit with young children during church. I know that our church doesn't mind children making noise during the worship service, but it can be uncomfortable for the family (especially if it's their first time attending). So, I'm asking us to step up and be prepared to offer something for young children on Sunday mornings when they attend.

A possible way to do this is to have people take one or two months a year. Our safe sanctuaries policy requires us to always have 2 adults present. So that this responsibility does not fall on a few people we will need a team to make this happen.

I so much appreciate Anita-Louise, Ross, Donna, and Brooke for helping me out with Wacky Wednesday. Because of their work we have witnessed our group grow in number and in spirit. It's not something I could have done on my own without them. Praise be to God that we have so many teens coming on Wednesday where they are loved and have found a safe place at a church (most for the first time in their lives ever stepping into the door of a church).

I know you as a church would like to see more young families. In order for this to happen we need you. Even if you don't feel you have the skills to lead, maybe you could be an assistant?

Additionally, Miriam told me yesterday "Daddy, I wonder if we had a part-time youth worker like at my other church I attend if that would attract young families with children". Years ago Trinity had a youth worker, but when we went through the church split over LGBTQ+ issues in 2018 we had to reduce our spending because we lost many who supported the church financially to make this possible. Maybe it's time for us as a church to begin that conversation. I see this as an investment in our church and in the future of young people. Just a thought for discussion :)

If we want young families we have to be prepared to make this a welcoming place for them. Would you consider being a part of that in some way?

TRUSTEES' UPDATE

Office and Apartment Remodel: the office remodel is complete except for the tweaks that all projects have. We had amazing help with construction, wiring, painting, moving everything over and keeping us well fed and well "coffeed". All was completed in 2 1/2 months! And as always it was such a great bonding experience for all of us. The final cost for materials is \$8,500. We had a generous donation of \$1,500 to go towards the painting, reducing our cost to \$7,000. We do still need to buy blinds for all of the windows. The next project to convert the old office into a 1 bedroom rental will start in early April. The design portion is currently underway.

Gardening: We will be having our annual Spring Clean day soon, to remove evidence of winter storms and spruce up the yards and flower beds. (TBD)

We are also looking for people who like to garden on a small scale, but regularly. The idea is to have people take ownership of certain areas of the church grounds. We already have a couple of flower beds spoken for but there are more spots. We want this to be fun and not overwhelming. If interested, contact Mary Hedberg or Ted Olsen.

Wish List:

Our TV in the Fellowship Hall died. It has been handy to have for presentations and we hope to replace it. If

anyone is upgrading their home TV and has a working TV, we would be interested. Please let any of the Trustees know.

We will need to get appliances for the new apartment: electric stove, microwave/hood, refrigerator, small stackable washer/dryer. Again, if anyone is upgrading their own appliances, we would love your old ones, if great condition. Please talk to Kevin O'Shea.

Our new conference room is larger than the old one so we can accommodate a larger table; this would allow us to offer this space to larger groups rather than the Fellowship Hall. If anyone has a table with several leaves, we would be interested. Again, contact any of the Trustees.

TRINITY UNITED WOMEN IN FAITH

Our UWF gathering for March was attended by 10 members for lunch and a presentation by Sarah on how to stock a home first aid kit. In addition, the members reviewed and discussed the contents and usage of the emergency medical kit that UWF has provided for the church, located in the right-hand cabinet of the foyer sideboard. We discussed that our outstanding missed item is still an emergency wheelchair to be kept on the church's main level for use in case an attendee at a service or other event needs assistance not severe enough to call 911. Sarah has made a contact with ECCHO and is waiting for input from them about how much of a donation from UWF will be needed to obtain a gently used wheelchair.

In addition, there was a consensus from the members that a Hands-Only CPR class is the next step in emergency preparedness not just for UWF, but for the congregation in general. Sarah pointed out that there is an information card on the simple steps to take for CPR in the medical cabinet, provided by Shirley Williams, RN. Sarah will bring up the idea of a church-wide educational session on this with Church Council.

Zoe Ann, our treasurer reported a balance of \$589 in the UWF checking account, with plans for at least one more donation still pending in April.

Debra, our VP, updated us on upcoming sessions. April

is our planned field trip, sponsored by Brian Hagemann in his job for the WA State Parks, to the Rothschild House. A vote was taken and the decision made to push our April meeting back a week to **Friday, April 18th**, as the Rothschild House Museum will not be open yet for the season on the 11th. We are scheduled to carpool to Terry and Mark Reitz's home in Quilcene in May for our Spring luncheon on May 9th.

Kathy O'Shea spoke with the members about an idea to hold a spaghetti dinner sometime this year in support of Ukraine or other causes that have been severely affected by our new federal administration. A lively discussion ensued. This will be pursued further on a general church level.

Finally, Sarah advised the group that, as of March, no one has volunteered to be considered for either the President or Vice-Presidential spots in UWF that will be vacant as of September. After a heartfelt discussion by several members, it was concluded that each member would pray about whether they wish UWF to continue in its current monthly status, less often, or be placed on indefinite hiatus. If the latter, Zoe Ann pointed out that the checking account balance in September should be closed out and donated as the members see fit. This subject will be discussed again in May at our luncheon at Terry's.

Moving forward into Lent with reverence. ■

During this challenging time in our country, check out the information below about justice opportunities:

The Jefferson Interfaith Action Coalition Sanctuary Network (JIAC/SN) meets in April on Tuesdays, 12:15-1:15, at First Presbyterian Church. All are welcome.

1) Saturday, April 5 from 1-2 PM, East Sims Way at Jefferson Street is "The Hands OFF! National Day of Action - Port Townsend Fights Back" demonstration. This national mobilization day is a message to the world that many do not consent to the destruction of our government and our economy to benefit billionaires. A core principle behind all Hands Off! Events is a commitment to nonviolent action and the expectation that all participants seek to de-

-escalate any potential confrontations with those who disagree with this action.

2) I attended the Jefferson County Immigrant Rights Advocates (JCIRA), "Train the Trainer Know Your Rights" program designed for congregations who want to know the laws about ICE and Border Patrol and to be ready to help undocumented immigrants. Trinity United Methodist's Candlelight Concerts host Michelle Huang, a concert pianist from Seattle, who will be performing at **Trinity United Methodist Church** on **Thursday, April 24, at 7:00 PM** for one set with no intermission.

The performance will also be streamed live at <https://trinityumcpt.org/> where you will find a link for the Candlelight Concerts Online and ways to donate. The concert will also be simulcast on KPTZ FM 91.9.

Admission to the concert is free (really!), with a suggested donation of \$15 per person. You are most welcome to attend whether you choose to donate or not. Half the proceeds will go to JCIRA (Jefferson County Immigrants' Rights Advocates) who "support the rights of immigrants and their families, giving priority to those who live or work on the Olympic Peninsula and immigrant detainees within Washington State, through access to legal services, standing witness, family support, community education and advocacy."

The program Huang will be presenting at the Candlelight concert is one that really speaks to her. The idea of connecting the past to the present, that the living composers are often influenced in some ways by masters from the past. This concert will present three sets of composers. Impressionist composer Claude Debussy and contemporary Australian composer Natalie Williams, Romantic pinnacle Johannes Brahms and American composer Missy Mazzoli, and Ragtime giant William Bolcom and one of his students and a professor of composition at the University of Colorado, Carter Pann. These three sets of pieces are without a doubt, connected to one another through rhythms, harmonies,

styles, and musical languages. Audiences are invited to hear the newly composed pieces through the lens of the old masters.

A native of Taiwan, Huang enjoys a rewarding career as a dynamic soloist and chamber musician. She is equally at home performing music ranging from the esteemed masters to the novel voices. Since moving to Seattle in 2021, she has collaborated with musicians from the Seattle Symphony, Seattle Philharmonic, and Seattle Pro Musica to curate and present innovative programs. She is happiest when playing concerts that allow her to storytell, to make connections, and to create an expansive and imaginative listening experience for the audience.

She has appeared as a guest artist across the continents, giving concerts, lectures, workshops, and master classes. As a devoted educator, she held teaching positions at Lincoln Memorial University, Edward Waters College, and Virginia Commonwealth University. In addition to collegiate teaching, she maintains a vibrant private teaching studio in Seattle, where she works with
