



SPOTLIGHT ON TRUSTEES

Hi, this is a new section of the newsletter devoted to the workings of the Trustees. We meet at **10 AM on the second Tuesday of the month** and would love to see you there. The present Trustees are Bill Brock, Acting Chairman and Kevin O'Shea Secretary and Maggie Hawley representing music and instruments, Ted Olsen exterior of our facilities, George Williams, and Harvey Crow. Kathy O'Shea reports on the usage and rentals.

The trustees are one of Leadership ministries of the Methodist church that is tasked with many responsibilities for the church both legal and administrative. There is a list of the many functions of the Trustees, and they are listed in the Book of Discipline P2525-2533 sections. A summary follows:

- All church facilities maintaining and supervising these facilities are under to be managed and maintained in order to facilitate the discipleship of the church.
- Receiving and administering all Material gifts to the church.

- In conjunction with the Pastor all uses of the buildings and facilities
- Maintaining adequate insurance on all properties and developing policies for risk management.
- Submit an annual report to Finance and budget requests as well as any planned improvements and maintenance for the year.
- The chair or designee is a member of the church council.

This is a basic idea of what we do. This year we are focusing on a new initiative to make our buildings more energy efficient and carbon neutral. This is being led by Ted and Kevin on boiler replacement and using electrical power in place of oil. And a special "friend of the committee" Dave Engle on the use of solar to offset our additional usage of the grid.

We are also looking at many other issues such as lighting to the exterior and general electrical upgrades lead by another "Friend of the committee" Ted Wimer (Ted 2). The new organ pipes are under way with an update

PASTOR'S LOG

In light of recent events I share with you a message from the Bishops of the UMC:


Grace and peace to you in the name of Jesus Christ

In recent days, events in Minnesota and beyond have caused deep grief, concern, and alarm across our connection. The use of lethal force in public spaces, the detention of naturalized citizens, members of our indigenous communities, children, documented and undocumented immigrants, and the treatment of other vulnerable persons have weighed heavily on the hearts of many in our church. These actions have unsettled communities, strained trust, and intensified fear among those already living at the margins.

Scripture reminds us that “when one part of the body suffers, we all suffer with them (1 Corinthians 12:26). As a Connectional church,



we are reminded that we are one body that cares for and needs each other. The whole body is suffering, right now, today! The violence being perpetrated on our streets, the loss of safety, and the inhumane treatment of God’s children, are hurting us all. We cannot stay silent in the face of the evils of our day.



The United Methodist Church deplores the use of violence, fear, separation, and intimidation as a means of creating social order. Such means do not build beloved community. We reaffirm our longstanding commitment to the sacred worth of every person and to the way of peace taught and embodied by Jesus. We stand against the separation of children from their families. We detest the inhumane, evil actions that are perpetuated by governmental authorities.

Our Social Principles are clear: “We reject governmental use of threats, extortion, unlawful detentions, extrajudicial killings, and other forms

of coercion to silence political opponents and those objecting to unlawful or immoral government policies and practices.” They further affirm that the church has both the right and the responsibility to educate and equip its members to be advocates for justice in the wider world (¶163D).


This is a moment that calls for prayerful courage to speak against actions that are bringing harm to our neighbors. This is our time to have an effectual faith that stands with those who are suffering. This is our faithful response to our baptismal vow that summons us into what is required of us “to act justly, love mercy and walk humbly with our God” (Micah 6:8). We must continue to work for justice to help heal the brokenness in our communities and in the world.

We ask you to pray for peace and

FINANCE COMMITTEE

HAPPY NEW YEAR Everyone. As we enter 2026 I have some very positive news to report from your Finance Committee.

We ended 2025 paying 100% of our Apportionments, funds assessed by the Conference to support the work of the Conference. The % assessed to all churches has been increased for 2026 and we will strive to meet that obligation.

The Finance Committee worked for three months to construct a Budget for 2026. That proposed Budget will be presented to our Church Council in February, and upon approval I will report it to the Trinity congregation. The budget will be posted in the Fellowship Hall.

I CAN tell you that the 2026 Budget being proposed is the most positive Budget we have had in years. I attribute this to two major factors...the GENEROSITY IN GIVING and the VOLUNTEER HOURS put in by so many offering outstanding quality of work and HUGE SAVINGS in what we would have had to pay for the work offered.

Finance proposed the creation of an Emergency Fund of \$20,000. The Fund was approved by Church Council. The money for this Fund came from the Aldrich money left to Trinity by Arthur Aldrich. The Emergency Fund will respond to unplanned maintenance needing to be done on short notice. Also legal fees and working with Trustees on budget availability.

We were notified by Faith Foundation, where our mortgage is held, that the percentage rate will increase from 3.75% to 6% in May 2026. This will not increase our Mortgage payments of \$1001.00 per month. It will extend the payment schedule, thus taking longer to pay off the mortgage.

Our Endowment Fund has earned nearly \$2,000 this year. This account is also held by Faith Foundation in a "diverse moderate" category. This Endowment offers everyone an opportunity to contribute at any time and also to leave donations in your Will instructions. The

account stands at \$14,086 and income from the account to Trinity can come from interest earned.

Please be aware that if you decide to contribute an EOG (Estimate Of Giving), anytime during the year, you may do so. You will receive an accounting of your contribution as it is tax deductible.

We have been blessed with a number of new members this year, expanding our Church Family with Love and Fellowship. We have added to our Staff by making Terry an "official" member, although we had elevated Terry and Diane to High C Level for many years. We have added one more person to our office staff, Melissa, who is working with Lynn to take over financial bookkeeping. We all know that Lynn's Administrative Guidance is a Gift beyond compare. We have been also Blessed with the approval of another year of Pastor Tony Brown's leadership and teachings and the extreme honor of being his friend.

Here we come 2026!!! Praising God for the Gift of Trinity Methodist Church and all the Blessings bestowed upon us through our work, our fellowship and our open hearts to Jesus and his teaching.

We provide meals for the family weekly along with a Love Box consisting of household needs—soap, paper towels, canned goods, etc. As a group we have been with this family for almost two years and the foster twins have been part of this family even longer. Adoption has finally been approved and should be completed this Spring. The family father has been in Mexico since the fall of '25 trying to get paperwork completed to receive a green card and to be able to come back home legally. It has been a slow process but he feels progress is being made. Mom works full time as an executive assistant at our local hospital and other family members include their 18 month biological son and another son who is 11. Please keep this busy family in your prayers as they move forward in the adoption process and welcoming dad back home! ■

Trinity United Methodist Church's Candlelight Concerts is delighted to host Lee-Alison Sibley, a local and international vocal artist, who will be performing at the Candlelight Concert series at Trinity United Methodist Church on Thursday, February 26 at 7:00 PM for one set with no intermission.

The performance will also be streamed live at <https://trinityumcpt.org/concerts> where you will find a link for the Candlelight Concerts Online and ways to donate. The concert will also be simulcast on KPTZ FM 91.9.

Admission to the concert is **free** (really!), with a suggested donation of \$15 per person. You are most welcome to attend whether you choose to donate or not. Half of the proceeds from this concert will go to Lee-Alison's chosen charity, Friends of Public Health. Jefferson County Public Health addresses community needs by providing education, access to health care, vaccines, disease investigation, and much more in their effort to support the population health of Jefferson County.

The program's theme "For the Birds" will especially delight bird enthusiasts as all the musical selections feature references to our feathered friends, ranging in songs from the 1600's through the 1900's and includes audience participation.

Lee-Alison Sibley has performed internationally for five

decades. She holds degrees in vocal performance from Boston University and the Manhattan School of Music and a Master of Education from George Mason University. Having sung everything from folk to Broadway to



opera in a variety of languages, Lee also recorded the songs of Bengali poet Rabindranath Tagore on her album "The Distant Near." In addition to her career as a vocal artist, Lee is an author of a memoir, "Jordan's Jewish Drama Queen" and a teacher, actor, and social activist. She represented the U. S. Department of State in singing tours in Asia and the Middle East. For her work helping develop education in underserved communities, she was awarded "Woman of the Decade" in 2017 at the Women's Economic Forum in New Delhi, India. She has always used her voice to

serve her philosophy, "tikkun olam" --heal the world-- and performed locally at Turtle Bluff for their scholarship drive and in 2025 for Black History Month at the United Methodist Church in Port Hadlock.

Lisa Lanza will be accompanying Lee-Alison Sibley's performance. Lisa has been performing as a solo artist and collaborator for over 20 years on the Olympic Peninsula and in the Seattle area. Some of her most memorable solo concerts include Music at Albignac in France, and at the Hebden Bridge Piano Festival in the UK. In





SOUPER WEDNESDAY

February 4th - March 25th, 11AM

During Lent we will be reading and discussing the book, "*Christ the Lord: Out of Egypt*", by Anne Rice. Rice (who wrote "*Interview with a Vampire*") departs from her supernatural roots to deliver a reverent, first-person account of the childhood of Jesus. Set in the first century, the story begins with a seven-year-old Jesus living in Alexandria, Egypt. After the death of the tyrant King Herod, his family—led by Joseph and Mary—begins a perilous journey back to their home in Nazareth.



Told through the innocent eyes of a child, the narrative explores Jesus's growing awareness of his divine nature and his struggle to understand the miraculous powers he possesses, such as healing the sick and bringing clay birds to life. Rice blends meticulous historical research with elements from the Infancy Gospels to depict a world of Roman occupation, Jewish tradition, and family secrets. It is a poignant meditation on the "silent years" of the Messiah, focusing on the moment a young boy realizes his extraordinary purpose in a violent and changing world. This book will give you an accurate historical and cultural context for the New Testament which will help you to understand the Bible in its original context and will offer insight into our own contemporary struggles we face in our world.




