With the help of Anita-Louise Marley and Ross Mayeda, we continue to create a fun safe place on Wednesdays where teens can be introduced to the church. Our main message is that we should love one another unconditionally. We usually have a craft or game and always have lots of good food for the teens to eat.

As like last year we have folded another 1,000 cranes as an art piece that will be donated to Victorian House before the school year ends. We started working on these back in September and just finished the project. Our crane art piece from last year still hangs in the cancer and infusion center at Jefferson Hospital. The staff and residents at Victoria House are looking forward to receiving this year's beautiful piece of art. The teens have also been practicing face painting and will

be staffing our Pride booth this year as face painters for children who come by our booth.

While we take the summer off from Wacky Wednesday we will be taking a 3 day trip in August. We have reserved a large home in Wenatchee and will stay there with day trips to Lake Chelan, Leavenworth, and to Wenatchee 1st UMC to work on a service project for the church. It continues to be extremely exciting to have all the teens as part of our extended church family and to build relationships with their families. Lino Rivera

Passion, Parody, and Humour

In-Person. Online & On the Air

Trinity United Methodist's Candlelight Concerts host Lino Rivera, a classical pianist, who will be performing at the **Candlelight Concert series at Trinity United Methodist Church** on **Thursday**, **June 27 at 7:00 PM** for one set with no intermission.

The performance will also be streamed live at https://trinityumcpt.org/concerts where you will find a link for the Candlelight Concerts Online and ways to donate. The concert will also be simulcast on KPTZ FM 91.9.

Admission to the concert is **free** (really!), with a suggested donation \$15 per person. You are most welcome to attend whether you choose to donate or not. Half of the proceeds from this concert will go to Rivera's chosen charity, Yea Music!, whose mission is to provide the youth of East Jefferson County with musical opportunities including instruments, instruction and performances.

Born in the Philippines, Rivera has performed as a solo recitalist, concerto soloist, chamber musician and accompanist on three continents. He makes it his mission to advocate and premiere contemporary works; to explore and meet the artistic, creative, and technical challenges of piano transcriptions; and to discover and perform obscure solo piano repertoire throughout the ages. Lino is a celebrated performer for Composers, Inc., an organization based in San Francisco that is dedicated to promoting works by contemporary American composers, where he has performed three World Premieres in past seasons. In a recent review from the San Francisco Classical Voice:

Bay Area pianist Lino Rivera played the North American Ballads of Frederic Rzewski superbly in Sep-



tember's concert from Composers Inc. These are big pieces, requiring endurance and virtuosity, and yet they have an immediacy that really gets to an audience, based as they are on recognizable tunes. They are also brilliantly colorful and fiendishly pianistic. Rivera made them come alive in a half-hour of remarkable music-making. The concert featured an abundance of new American music, played to the hilt and rewarded with a nonstop standing ovation.

Rivera currently serves as Professor of Music at Saint Mary's College of California. He holds degrees in piano performance from the University of Santo Tomas, the University of Hawaii, and a doctorate from the University of Maryland. Lino maintains active concert engagements across the country, and is a regular performer, teacher, and chamber music coach at music festivals here and abroad.

The program will include selections from Beethoven, Chopin, Liszt, Brahms, Schumann and Debussy. The

CHURCH COUNCIL REPORT

The April 28th Administrative Board meeting started with a review of the purpose of the Church Council from the 2016 Book of Discipline. The Book of Discipline recommends that the first agenda items for our meetings relate to our ministries of nurture, outreach and witness and we will try to do that. We also decided to call ourselves the Church Council instead of Administrative Board.

NURTURE, OUTREACH AND WITNESS

Kitchen: We started with a report from Sarah Heiner on the committee that is overseeing the kitchen cleanliness, accessibility, supplies and tracking groups making use of the facility.

Candlelight Concerts: Beth Kissinger came to the meeting as the representative of the Candlelight Concerts. We voted to make this a new position on the council. They have musicians booked through mid-2025. The last concert brought in \$1700 with the Courtyard Café as beneficiary.

Strategic Communications: Lynn is working on refreshing the website in light of tourist season and the time of year some people move and may be looking for a new church home.

Then Bess Anne gave the council copies of the home pages from the local Presbyterian, Episcopalian, and Lutheran churches as well as our own. There was a survey form to record likes and dislikes.

The characteristics which met with approval:

- Clear indication of time for Sunday service.
- Good photos of the church, pastor and members of the congregation.
- Indication of being reconciling and welcoming.
- Information on outreach.
- Pleasant background color, such as light green, definitely not black.

St. Pauls' has thumbnail photos which link to additional information on a variety of subjects. These were noted by several people.



The characteristics which met with disapproval:

- Lack of current photos, especially photos with people.
- Lack of information on church location and service times.
- Too much busy-ness, blank space, and useless photos.
- Lack of information on outreach and music.

Olympic Angels: Beth Kissinger reported on the Olympic Angels group that works with a single father and foster son who have a mission to feed the homeless. Donna Purnell reported on the other Olympic Angel group which supports a family where the foster father is the primary caregiver. The two groups provide support for their foster family in entirely different ways showing that flexibility is important in this ministry.



Handy Helpers – Kevin O'Shea reported on the Handy Helpers activities. There was talk about a men's group breakfast on Saturday mornings that continues into work on a project. However, the guestion came up about what if women or couples would be interested in working on a project once a month.

Mission - We are talking about how to have the best representation for Missions on the council when outreach is carried out by several groups.

ADMINISTRATIVE & SUPPORTIVE RESPONSIBILITIES

Budget & Finances: Zoe Ann Dudley reported that giving is off a little. Currently only about 75% of the amount indicated on the annual Estimates of Giving forms (EOGs) is coming in. Also, there is \$1500 available for music scholarships. Two students have been tentatively identified, but everything isn't worked out yet.

Lay Leadership: Dan Purnell noted that he talks to Tony weekly about the things he is aware of that are going on in the church family. He and Tony will represent the church for the annual conference meeting in June.

Staff Parish Relations: Sally Helman noted that she still wants another person for her committee.

Kevin asked who is on the Nominating Committee and it sounds like two more members are needed for that as well.

Trustees: Kathy O'Shea gave the report on the activities of the trustees:

- A picket fence is being installed in front of the preschool building.
- They have asked for an estimate to repair the Benson - Short Memorial Window built in the 1970's by members of the church.
- Saturday Market will move to Taylor St for about 2 months this summer. The Trustees are looking into how we can assist and how we can benefit from this change.
- We need to remind those using our facilities that they need to cleanup.
- There is an increase in facility usage.


