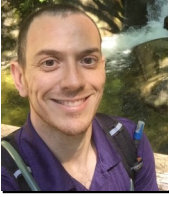

PASTOR'S LOG

There's a moment in the Pentecost story that I love.

The Spirit shows up. Wind fills the room. Fire lands on heads. And then everybody starts talking — not in one language, but in everybody's language. At the same time. All at once. Parthians heard Parthian. Egyptians heard Egyptian. Every single person heard the good news in the exact words that lived in their own heart.

Same message. Same Spirit. Same purpose. Different language for every single person.

I think that's exactly how the Spirit still moves. Through us. Right now. In this community.

I've been subbing in the schools this year, and the work is figuring out what language reaches each kid. What does this child need today to feel like they matter? I didn't walk into that classroom carrying a Bible. But I walked in carrying something. That's my translation.

Some of you — your translation is music. The Candlelight Concert series happens because people work behind the scenes so that strangers can walk through our doors on a Thursday night and feel something open inside them. Over \$120,000 has gone back into this community through that work. That's not a side effect. That's the language doing exactly what it was meant to do.

Some of you — your translation is a hammer. Handy Helpers shows up and fixes what's broken and says you are not invisible. You don't have to preach a word. You just fix the thing. That's the gospel in work gloves.

And then there are the Wacky Wednesday kids — fighting for immigrant rights not by marching, but by



putting on a talent show. The Wacky Wednesday Showcase is June 6th at 5pm and 7pm, raising money for the Northwest Immigrant Rights Project with a goal of \$2,000. Same fight. Different language. Tickets are available — just reach out.

Here's what I want to say to this congregation. You are doing good work. Don't measure your contribution against someone else's. The person marching in a rally is not more faithful than the person writing a check. The person with the hammer is not more holy than the person running sound. We are not in competition with each other. We are in concert with each other.

The answer to how we respond to the crises of our time isn't this one thing or that one thing. It's blowing in the wind — moving through all of us, each one hearing a different call, speaking a different language, doing the particular thing that only they can do.

A hammer here. A cello there. A classroom. A talent show. A letter. A march. An open door.

The wind is still blowing.

FINANCE COMMITTEE REPORT

Since the June publication of The Trinity Times will be the last one until September, we thought that we would publish our financial position for the January-May period instead of waiting for the full six-months period.

Our overall income to date from EOGs, non-EOGs, loose offerings (Sunday services), Candlelight concerts, Parsonage rent, et. al., was \$116,768 as compared to the budget of \$96,345 (+21.2% over). That leaves us currently in a very good position to cover our basic expenses. Please note, however, that we still have seven months left this fiscal year, so some donations will invariably slow down. Total expenditures for the January-June period were \$101,866 compared to the budget of \$98,066 (+3.9% overspent).

As we indicated in the last quarterly report, our original budget projection showed a shortage of \$5,656, income compared to expenses. To date, part of this shortage has been made up by approximately \$1,600 from the Garden Sales (\$1,489.25) and the Trinity mug sales (\$136, including mug cost). Well done, everyone, who worked and contributed to the cause. Please continue to support present and future events such as the coffee mugs, rummage sales, etc.

While this is not the time to relax our efforts, we have a very good chance for a successful fiscal year. Thank you, All!

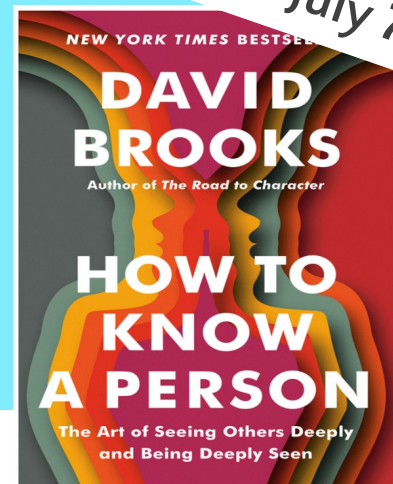

ENERGY STRATEGY TEAM

Faithful Stewards of God's Creation

TUMC moving towards a better energy future!

All of us are called to be faithful stewards of God's creation. When we speak of caring for God's creation, we recognize the richness of that gift. Being good stewards means recognizing our impact on the environment and making intentional choices to protect it and pass it on. Our actions reflect our respect for God and honor this sacred gift!

The annual PNW Methodist conference also recognized this when they passed a bold resolution to strive towards 50% improved energy efficiency by 2030 and net-zero greenhouse gas emissions by 2040 in all operations.

In response, the TUMC Trustees has formed a working committee charged with developing a strategic roadmap and action plan regarding energy. This team met for the first time on May 6, 2026, with George Williams, Harvey Crow, Paul Nebel, Ted Olson, Dave Codier and David Engle as the current members.

Our first meeting was one of discovery - what do we

know about TUMC's use of energy and where do we have gaps in our knowledge? Not surprisingly we found the list of gaps much longer than the list of what we know! But this began the development of a road map towards closing these knowledge gaps and identifying possible steps TUMC can make to be better stewards of God's creation and TUMC resources (which include your donations!).

One of our first steps is to conduct a professional energy audit paid for by a generous \$500 donation to match an energy audit grant. This audit will be done in June, and the results will go a long way in answering our questions about our facility's energy use and infrastructure. From that audit we will begin to develop a strategy that moves us to a better energy future.

Throughout the process, the team will keep the congregation informed and encourage interested members of the congregation to give us feedback and even attend our open team meetings! This will be a carefully considered journey with many challenges and complexities, but also potential for some very exciting outcomes!

Piano Transcriptions of Works by Bach, Beethoven, Schubert and Bellini*

In-Person, Online & On the Air

Trinity United Methodist's Candlelight Concerts host Lino Rivera, a classical pianist, who will be performing at the Candlelight Concert series at Trinity United Methodist Church on Thursday, June 25 at 7:00 PM for one set with no intermission.

The performance will also be streamed live at <https://trinityumcpt.org/concerts> where you will find a link for the Candlelight Concerts Online and ways to donate. The concert will also be simulcast on KPTZ FM 91.9.

Admission to the concert is **free** (really!), with a suggested donation \$15 per person. You are most welcome to attend whether you choose to donate or not. Half of the proceeds from this concert will go to Rivera's chosen charity, the Recovery Cafe.

Born in the Philippines, Rivera has performed as a solo recitalist, concerto soloist, chamber musician and accompanist on three continents. He makes it his mission to explore and meet the artistic, creative, and technical challenges of piano transcriptions; to advocate and premiere contemporary works; and to discover and perform obscure solo piano repertoire throughout the ages. Rivera holds a Bachelor of Music degree in piano performance from the University of Santo Tomas (Manila), a master's from the University of Hawaii, and a doctorate from the University of Maryland. He currently serves as Professor of Music in the Performing Arts Department at Saint Mary's College of California, while maintaining active concert engagements domestically and internationally. Rivera has been invited



back for the third time as a performing faculty member at the Music & More Summer Music Festival in Bosnia Herzegovina in August 2026.

The program for the Candlelight Concert will feature selections from Schubert, Bach, Beethoven and Bellini which illustrate the 3 types of piano transcription or piano arrangement: literal transcription, partition or reduction and metamorphosis.

Trinity United Methodist Church is located at 609 Taylor Street, across from the Community Center, in Uptown. Attendees should plan on arriving early – doors will open at 6:30. Masks are encouraged for in-person attendees. ■

HEARING ENHANCEMENT TECHNOLOGY IS AVAILABLE

Hearing enhancement technology is available. We have a Hearing Loop System that works in the main sanctuary (not the balcony or side room). Hearing loop systems transmit sound from a microphone directly into listeners' hearing aids or cochlear implants, free from ambient or background noise. You may need to ask your provider if your hearing aid has a 'telecoil' or 't-coil', and have them program or activate it for you.

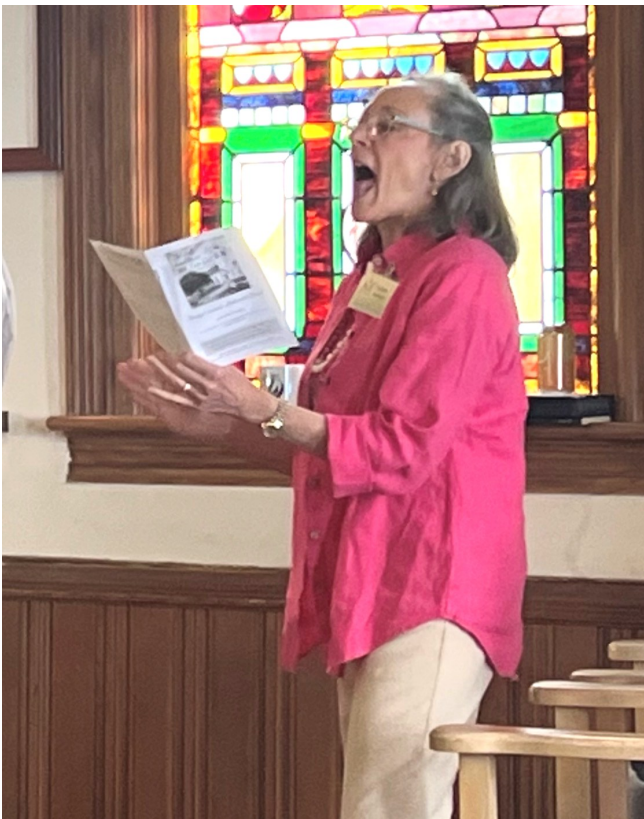
