PASTOR'S LOG

Dear . Church,

In my 12 years as Pastor here at Trinity I have never seen our budget as healthy as it has been this year. This is all thanks to you and the sacrifices you make to support the mission of our church. Through your financial gifts and acts of service to help us raise money and save money we have had all the financial resources that we have needed in order to do the work of church. I personally wanted to thank you and give you a few examples of how your sacrifices are making a difference in the lives of others.

First I want to mention our worship services. Without the gifts and acts of service you make to our church we would not be able to pay our staff, upkeep our building and instruments, stream our services, or even print a bulletin. While these might not sound exciting, the results of this are life changing for many. I can't begin to tell you the number of people who tell me how important our worship is in their lives. Many in the congregation share with me how important the weekly services are to their spiritual, mental, and emotional well being. Some have even commented that it has radically changed their lives for the good. We even have one person who lives out of state and watches the streaming service. They have told me that they do not consider themselves Christian, but they watch the service regularly because it is very meaningful to them. They've commented to me that while they would never attend a church they would most likely attend our church if they lived nearby.

Secondly, we have been able to pay our apportionments in full this year. To many, the "apportionment" is a word you might not be familiar with in the United Methodist Church. The apportionment is our fair share of the work of the United Methodist Church around the world. About \$20,000 a year is given by Trinity to this work. It includes everything from feeding others, improving health care, educating, and working to bring

peace in our world. This is also how we pay our Bishop, annual conference staff, and district staff. Without them and their work we would not have the support we need to offer ministries here at our church and around the world. There are literally thousands of ministries that we support through this giving. You can read more about the apportionments by googling "apportionments umc".

Thirdly, your giving helps to support numerous ministries of the church like Wacky Wednesday. This year we have 15 teens involved in our Wacky Wednesday program. Most of these kids have never even entered the doors of a church. By providing a safe, fun, and loving place for these teens they are being introduced to a version of Christianity that they do not see in the media. Experiencing a church loving them and valuing them for who they are, "beautiful children of God", they are growing in their relationship with the church, one another, and the adults who oversee this program.

These are only 3 examples of the ways your giving and sacrifices are helping to affect lives both locally and around the world. I'd have to write many pages to highlight all the ways your giving is helping to change lives through the ministry of Trinity UMC.

2 Corinthians 9 says, "Whoever sows sparingly will also reap sparingly, and whoever sows generously will also reap generously. Each of you should give what you have decided in your heart to give, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver. ... You will be enriched in every way so that you can be generous on every occasion, and through us your generosity will result in thanksgiving to God."

Thank you! Thank you! Thank you...for making a difference in the lives of so many!

Trinity United Methodist's Candlelight Concerts host the Jean Lenke Jazz-Folk Quartet, a jazz-folk fusion artist and her band, who will be performing at the Candlelight Concert series at Trinity United Methodist Church on October 26 at 7:00 PM for one set with no intermission. This will be a live concert with doors opening at 6:30 PM.

The performance will also be streamed live at <u>trinityumcpt.org/concerts</u> where you will find a link for the Candlelight Concerts Online and ways to donate. The concert will also be simulcast on KPTZ FM 91.9.

Admission to the concert is **free** (really!), with a suggested donation \$15 per person. You are most welcome to attend whether you choose to donate or not. Half of the proceeds from this concert will go to Jean's chosen charity, Dove House, <u>dovehousejc.org</u>, whose mission is to empower victims of crime and abuse in Jefferson County through education, advocacy and crisis intervention.

With a beautifully smooth and soulful voice, Pacific Northwest Jazz, Folk & Blues vocal artist Jean Lenke paints music in full color, with broad strokes and a free hand. As bandleader her approach to music is free spirited, crossing boundaries and mixing genres ~ she doesn't always color inside the lines. Whether performing with an intimate acoustic Duo or Trio, with her 6-piece "Jean Therapy West Band", or with her all women Red Rose Quintet, Jean's fresh approach to Classic Jazz is influenced by an eclectic mix of mid-century Folk, Jazz-Rock Fusion and Soulful heartfelt passion for life.

For this year's Candlelight Concert, Jean will present a selection of songs that reach back to her Folk roots,



many of them message songs often sung once upon a time ago in church. She will be accompanied by Steve Kirk on the guitar, Jim Charlier on the bass, and Ed Donohue on the Trumpet & Flugelhorn.

- YTD August Annualized EOGs (Estimates of Giving) are \$1,061 over budget @ 101.2%
- YTD August Non-Pledge Contributions are \$3,335 over budget @ 126.3%
- YTD August Loose Offerings are \$1,905 over budget @ 171.4%
- YTD August Annualized Total EOG+Non-Pledge are \$4,396 over budget @ 104.4%
- YTD August Annualized TOTAL INCOME is \$6,262 over budget @ 104.9% (includes all donations, rents, Candlelight Concerts, etc.)
- YTD TOTAL EXPENSES are \$6,366 UNDER BUDGET @ 95%
- Cornerstone Pledges continue to provide monies for our monthly mortgage payment of \$1,001.

Our group luncheons will continue to meet in the Fellowship Hall on the second Friday of each month at



11:30 am, unless otherwise stated, and will be potlucks. However, in December, our Christmas party will be a luncheon potluck at Sarah's home in Cape George Colony, with a return of the carol sing-along. Members may invite friends and family, but need to give Sarah a headcount at least a week in advance.

At the October 20th meeting, we will have an activity rather than a speaker and work on baskets and crafts for the November 4th fund-raiser. This show, curated by Brian Perry, features the work of four artists, Brian Perry and Kelly Sullivan of the Port Gamble S'Klallam tribe with carving and print and weaving, and Dan and Raya Friday of the Lummi tribe with glass and cedar sculpture. "These artists carry ancient culture, images, and stories into the present." Come for music, refreshments, and demonstrations. The exhibit continues through December 31. Free admission and extended hours every first Saturday of the month.

As the days grow shorter and there is more evening reading time, take a moment before or after church to browse the Faith, Peace, and Justice Library. Lately on TV, there have been trailers for the new movie, "Killers of the Flower Moon." This movie is based on a book in our library, "Killers of the Flower Moon the Osage Murders and Birth of the FBI". The movie won't be released until October 20, but you can check out the book now!

Besides adult books, if you want a short read, try one of Mildred Taylor's youth books, about Black families

during the Jim Crow Era. Or check out one of the Southern Poverty Law Center's magazines, such as "Learning for Justice" with ideas for supporting youth or "Hate and Extremism in 2022," the yearly review by the SPLC. And don't forget there are wonderful, age-appropriate picture books to read and discuss with children.

This year's WAVE Food Drive for our local Food Banks is under way. You can bring dry goods, canned goods, and cash/checks to worship



through Sunday, October 22 (or the following week during office hours). Please make checks out to "Trinity UMC", so we can track how much we are donating. Checks are most welcome because they are able to purchase food at only a few cents per pound.

Home-canned foods cannot be accepted, but store-bought canned foods that are past their expiration dates by less than three years can be donated.

Pet food is really important because they can't buy it unless someone specifies it on their check (feel free to note this on your check). Dry pet food can be opened, unlike food for people. Donations are split equally between the area's food banks: Port Townsend, Tri-Area, Quilcene, and Brinnon.


