PPS. Blessings to everyone for everything...it was fun...doesn't mean that we are not searching for 2026's 'Boss'. ■



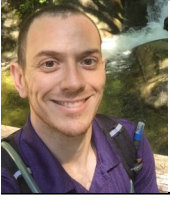

On July 23rd a group of 12 from Trinity went to Kenya to build a house, do medical clinics, deworm children, and work at the Methodist Bio Intensive farm in Meru. The home that we built provided a family of 7 with a needed home because their home was rotting and falling apart. The medical clinics served

more than 1000 people with free outpatient care. They received consultation with a doctor and then received medical tests and medication if they needed it. They also could see an eye doctor and receive free eye glasses if they were needed. We gave deworming medication to more than 800 children which will last for up to a year and then they will be followed up with after that. Additionally the team paid for a commercial stove and warmer so that the Bio-Intensive Farm could open a farm to table restaurant.

We are now raising funds to be able to provide two of the local Methodist churches with a catfish farm. This initial investment of \$1200 for each church will provide an income of between \$2500-\$3000 a year for each of the churches which will enable them to help people in need in their churches.

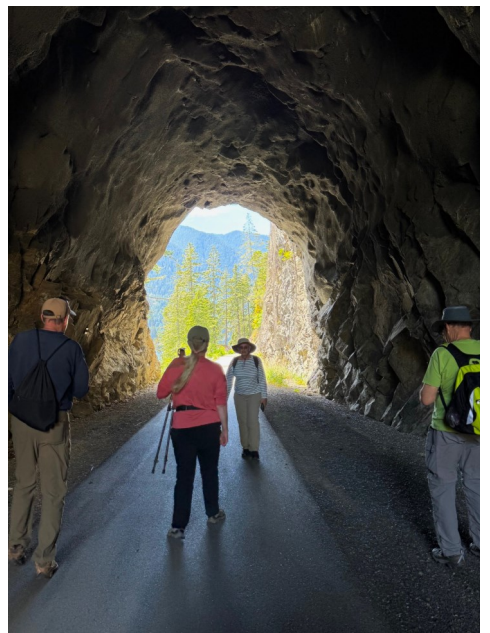
TRINITY HIKING GROUP

Trinity United Methodist's Candlelight Concerts host Michael Carroll, a classical pianist, who will be performing at the Candlelight Concert series at Trinity United Methodist Church on Thursday, September 25th at 7:00 PM for one set with no intermission. This will be a live concert with doors opening at 6:30 PM.

The performance will also be streamed live at <https://trinityumcpt.org/concerts> where you will find a link for the Candlelight Concerts Online and ways to donate. The concert will also be simulcast on KPTZ FM 91.9.

Admission to the concert is **free** (really!), with a suggested donation \$15 per person. You are most welcome to attend whether you choose to donate or not. Half of the proceeds from this concert will go to Carroll's chosen charity, Bayside Housing, whose mission is to "strengthen community through housing, advocacy and human services supporting social and economic independence".

Carroll's concert program will include musical selections drawn from the heart of the classical repertoire: Bach, Mozart, Brahms, Chopin and Schubert with a little Americana thrown in at the end in the form of Aaron Copland and Scott Joplin.

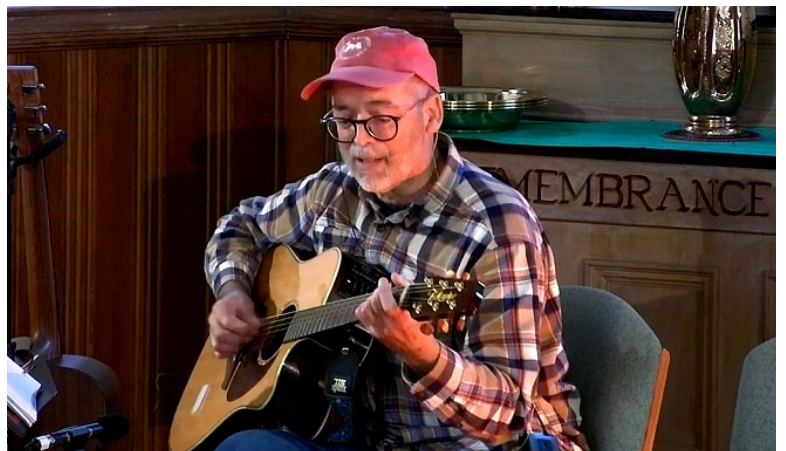
Pianist Michael Carroll began piano study at age eight and studied with several teachers, most notably Robert Van Meter at Clarion State College in Pennsylvania. Since moving to Seattle in 1990, he has played numerous recitals and chamber music performances and has soloed in concertos by Haydn, Mozart, Poulenc, Bartok and Grieg. An experienced choral and vocal accompanist, he has performed with many Seattle area ensem-



bles and soloists and for ten years was the staff pianist and program annotator for Seattle's Thalia Symphony Orchestra. He is currently co-director of the Port Townsend Symphony Orchestra Chamber Music Series. He lives and teaches in Port Ludlow.

Trinity United Methodist Church is located at 609 Taylor Street, across from the Community Center, in Uptown. Attendees should plan on arriving early – doors will open at 6:30. Masks are encouraged for in-person attendees. ■

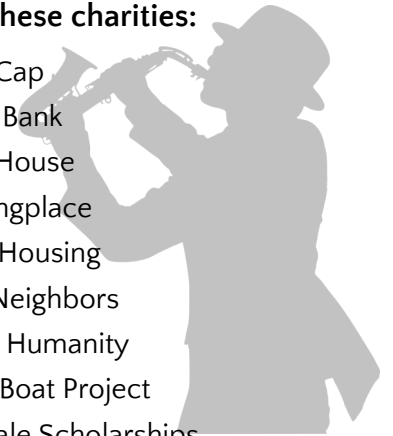

Staying true to our mission beyond politics

A message from Bishop Cedrick Bridgeforth
offering guidance for clergy and congrega-
tions in a time of partisan division

Beloved siblings in Christ across the Greater Northwest Area,

I write to you with care and conviction regarding a matter that is drawing public attention and raising important questions for us as United Methodist leaders and congregations. A recent IRS ruling suggests churches and religious organizations may not automatically lose their tax-exempt status if they engage in political endorsements. While such a ruling may provide legal cover for partisan endorsements, it does not change who we are—or how we are called to live out our faith—as United Methodists.

Here in the **Greater Northwest Area**, we know what it means to hold diverse perspectives in community. From the bustling, tech-driven culture of Seattle to the rural landscapes of Alaska and Idaho, from Portland's creative activism to the agricultural heart of eastern Washington and Oregon, from indigenous wisdom to the voices of immigrant communities—the Pacific Northwest teaches us that diversity is not a weakness but a gift. This region shows us daily that we can listen across differences, wrestle with complex issues, and remain bound together by grace.

Our mission is clear: we exist to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world. That mission does not align us with political parties or candidates. When churches or clergy engage in partisan political endorsements, we risk diminishing our witness, distorting our message, and dividing the Body of Christ. Instead, our calling is to be a beacon of God's love, justice, and grace for all people, not a platform for political agendas.

The Social Principles of The United Methodist Church give us guidance here. The United Methodist Church affirms the integrity and independence of both the Church and the State, advocating for a relationship rooted in mutual respect, not domination or coercion. We encourage churches to speak out boldly on issues and policies from a gospel perspective. We further believe churches have a right and responsibility to educate and equip their congregations and communities to be effective advocates for justice in the wider world" (United Methodist 2025–2028 Social Principles, *The Political Community, Government Responsibilities, A, Church and Governments*).

I strongly advise all United Methodist clergy and congregations in the Greater Northwest Area to refrain from engaging in partisan political endorsements or affiliations in the name of the Church. As individuals, clergy and laity are encouraged to participate fully in the democratic process. But as the Church, our pulpits and platforms are not tools of partisan politics. They are spaces where the gospel is proclaimed, governments are held accountable, and the marginalized are defended. They are spaces where we speak and act against poverty, racism, violence, and injustice—not out of allegiance to any party but rooted in scripture and our Wesleyan tradition of faith put into action.

Our time to live our witness is now. Every disciple can have opinions, voice support, and maintain integrity without having pulpits and meeting rooms mimic our political arenas. Be the difference the world needs. Give the world an alternative view of what is possible.

Let us continue to lead with conviction and humility, always keeping our eyes on the calling to love God, love our neighbors, and embody the gospel of Jesus Christ in all that we do.
