SPOTLIGHT ON: GEORGIA THOMATOS

St. Constantine's name day falls on May 21 and in 1965, my mom planned a big party for my Dad Kosta's name day and promptly told the doctor that she could not have a baby that day when the wise doctor told her, 'I don't know what plans you have for today lady, but you are having a baby'. There was a double celebration that day as that is my birthday!

I lived my entire childhood in Sacramento, CA as an exuberantly happy child with a younger sister as a constant playmate. In 4th grade, we moved from the Greek Orthodox Church to the Free Methodist Church as my parents wanted to study the Bible and that was frowned upon by their priest.

I became involved in missions and went to Zimbabwe and Malawi between my Jr. and Sr. years of high school for 3 months, staying with two medical doctors from India. I was allowed to help in surgery, pull teeth, and delivered my first baby! I loved learning and knew by age 5

that I wanted to be a doctor, but that trip solidified that dream.

I pursued my undergrad education at UC Davis. Thinking I'd be a missionary doctor, I attended Western Evangelical Seminary (now George Fox University) and received a Masters in Missions before heading to Cincinnati for medical school—they let us loose on the hospital wards 2 weeks after arriving and I learned best by doing.

After a 3 year residency in Merced, CA, I moved to Sonora, CA for 29 years, practicing for 8 years with a hospital doing rural birth to death medicine and then switching to work at a men's prison for 17 years because I decided to become a single mother by choice—Joy being my delightful daughter!

I was able to retire at the ripe age of 55 partly because I hated the micro-management that started towards the end of my prison stay and partly because I had 4 major surgeries and needed one more



that left me using forearm crutches to this day if I walk farther than a few blocks.

I love to travel and volunteer and have been to Zimbabwe, Malawi, Mexico, Honduras, Rwanda, Papua New Guinea, Ecuador x 2, Tanzania and Uganda x 2 on medical mission trips and traveled for fun to Europe, Kenya and Australia.

After retiring, I became very involved in starting a new church and was on the teaching team for

PASTOR'S LOG

Dear Church,

I am writing to you as I prepare to leave Meru, Kenya, where I have spent the last three weeks doing some of the most meaningful work of my ministry – and some of the most important work of my life.

You gave me this time. I want you to know what you gave it for.

When I arrived here, I came not only to serve but to 8nd healing and rest. I learned things here that will stay with me and that have helped me in my ongoing faith journey in ways I could not have anticipated.

Here is what happened.

I spent my days at the Methodist Treatment and Rehabilitation Center in Meru, sitting in group therapy with thirty Kenyan men in recovery, eating meals with them instead of the sta7 room they o7ered me, playing chess with bottle caps and cement and rocks collected by four children who brought me four hundred of them for one shilling each. I taught the men a game I know that now has a Kenyan name – Kamuchezo. I spoke to them about my own story, and several of them came to me afterward and said they could identify.

I identi8ed with them too.



Trinity has three 8sh ponds in this region – ponds your generosity helped build. I visited them. There's been a drought, and the water was low, and we paid to have a water truck come pump fresh water in because I could not stand to watch something we built together fail for lack of one hundred dollars. They pulled cat8sh from those ponds with burlap nets and sent me home with two of them, which I cooked for dinner that night. Trinity fed me in Kenya in a way none of us planned.



I used money donated by some of you to purchase many books to start a library at the rehab center for the clients. I've also begun to develop and implement a plan to allow residents from the USA and the UK to travel to Kenya to receive treatment from alcohol and drug addiction at the Methodist Rehab and Treatment center. This will not only provide a7ordable treatment for those who do not have the money for it in the USA and UK, but it will bring in lots of needed funds for the center.

I walked three miles into town with a nine-year-old boy whose father left when he was two, and I told him that my father wasn't around either. I brought him a laptop donated by



someone. I set up his Gmail account and taught him to type with games. We paid 8ve hundred shillings (\$3.50) for him to ride an ingatable slide as many times as he wanted. We bought Scrabble and watercolors and a strawberry cake for the children at the farm where his mother works – a farm that Trinity also helped support last year.

I met a man named Nelson who is doing underground LGBTQ+ advocacy work in Meru County at a considerable personal risk, providing support groups, legal advocacy, and community for people who have no legal protection for who they are. I spent a day with him and came home changed in ways I am still processing.

I met a man named Mwenda – my given Kenyan name, the name tattooed on my arm, the name you have heard me speak from the pulpit – who stood up at a family day



celebration and said he had been born again twice. Once through faith in God. The second time through freedom from addiction. There was a cake. It said Happy Re-Birth. I sat in the back of the room and thanked God.

I also had my own personal sessions with Dr. Monica, head of clinical psychology at Kenya Methodist University. I rode a bike through the streets of Meru. I walked four miles a day. I ate organic food and drank fresh-squeezed juice and sat on the biointensive farm in the red clay soil that looks exactly like the hills of East Tennessee where I grew up, reading my books, watching the weaver birds build their impossible nests in the thorn trees.

I also recognized that we as a church have been answering the call by our Bishop to 8ght the e7ects of racism in our world. Sadly, the lasting e7ects of white colonialism and racism are so evident everywhere you look in Kenya. Additionally the cuts to USAID are literally allowing people to die in Kenya. I've seen it 8rsthand. I'm proud of our church for doing something about this and responding to the call to end racism in our world by supporting and working alongside our Kenyan family as they lead the work of bringing wholeness and justice to their communities. They may not be Americans, but they are our family.

I leave Kenya changed. Clear. Present. Grateful in the quiet, cellular way that doesn't need to announce itself.

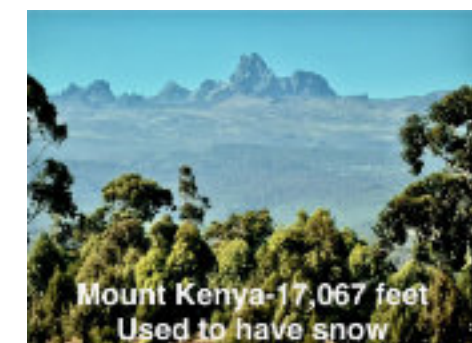
You gave me this time. You allowed me to go. You prayed for me, and I felt it.

I am coming home your pastor. But I am also coming home as a better, renewed, and refreshed pastor who has much to share with you that I've learned and experienced.

Thank you for being Trinity. Thank you for being the kind of church that makes room – for the thirty men in recovery, for the boy, for Nelson, for Mwenda, and for your pastor who needed to come to Africa alone to more fully discover God's love and grace in his life.

I've missed you all and look forward to seeing you soon.

Energy Team Report! (• it's electrifying...!!)

Energy Team Goals:

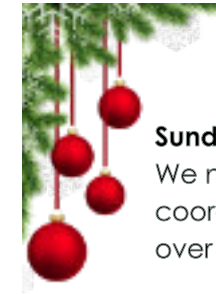
- ‡ Eliminate all fossil fuel consumption
- ‡ Maximize efficient use of electricity
- ‡ Minimize dependence on grid electricity

Energy Team Activities

- ‡ TUMC Facility Energy Study: Complete
- ‡ Convert water/building heating from fossil fuel to electric: In Progress
- ‡ Improve efficient use of electricity (several small projects): In Progress
- ‡ Develop a phased plan for a scalable solar system: In Progress
- ‡ Install Phase I Solar: Near Future (2026 or 2027)

These goals and activities are actively moving us towards zero carbon emissions (PNW District Goal) and onsite electrical generation (TUMC Goal). This electrical generation capability (solar) will allow us to become a community resilience center during grid failures. Developing a phased solar array/battery system is the big leap for our church and we are just in the initial exploration stages with contractors and 8eld experts.

We'll keep you updated on those projects as they become more defined and specific. Mostly, we wanted to assure you that we are charting an energy future that helps us serve our own purposes, meets our energy goals, while becoming an asset to the community in times of need. In these uncertain times of economic, political and technological changes, the most prudent and faithful course would seem to be towards greater energy independence and serving the community God has placed us within! ■

After retirement, I looked for a cooler place to live and fell in love with Port Townsend. Besides my involvement here at Trinity, I volunteer at the local Food Bank and at the General Store at Community UMC.

One never knows what life will bring, but that's part of the adventure. I can see God's presence with me throughout life, even though at times I doubted, but being honest about that has been freeing. I truly love serving alongside all of you! ■

Trinity United Methodist's Candlelight Concerts host Eric Kosarot, a local guitarist/banjo musician who will be performing his original compositions at the Candlelight Concert series at Trinity United Methodist Church on Thursday, September 24th at 7:00 PM for one set with no intermission.

Admission to the concert is **free** (really!), with a suggested donation \$15 per person. You are most welcome to attend whether you choose to donate or not. Half of the proceeds from this concert will go to Kosarot's chosen charity, The Dove House, whose mission is to 'empower victims of crime and abuse in Jefferson County through education, advocacy, and crisis intervention.'

For this concert, Kosarot will be playing his original songs on guitar, harmonica, banjo and fiddle. The songs will range from traditional old-time tunes to Sea-Shanties and Gospel music. In addition, he will be reading from a

collection of original nature poems

Kosarot was raised in a musical family. As a little boy, his father played guitar as his son fell sleep and his mom took him to church where they sang hymns and gospels together. Kosarot started learning to play piano at age 12 and then in high school learned to play the guitar, tenor saxophone and jazz band guitar. From high school on, he's been involved in many bands and more recently in various old-time jam groups hosted at homes, venues, and festivals around the Pacific Northwest.

Trinity United Methodist Church is located at 609 Taylor Street, across from the Community Center, in Uptown. Attendees should plan on arriving early & doors will open at 6:30. Masks are encouraged for in-person attendees.

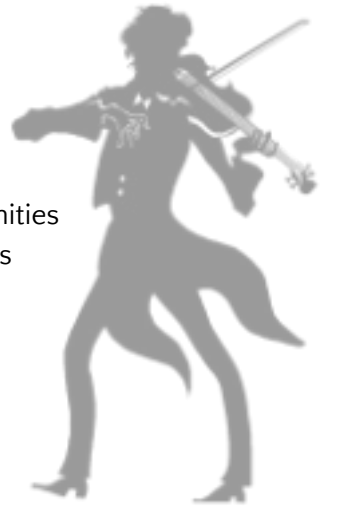

FINANCE COMMITTEE SUMMER REPORT

This report covers the first seven months of our fiscal year (January-July, 2026) plus the Rummage Sale that took place on August 21 and 22.

Our overall financial position is in a relatively healthy position with 8ve months to go in this calendar year. On the income side, we have accumulated \$153,089 as compared to the budget of \$134,883 (plus 13.5% over budget through July 31). Our expenses are slightly over budget (+5.3%) of \$143,341 versus the budget of \$136,341 for the same period. Our Operating Checking account, which is used to pay our everyday expenses, stands at \$18,524. As an aside, we average monthly expenses at \$19,137.

Now a few words about our amazing Rummage Sale. As of this writing, we have received proceeds of \$9,871.09, which is more than twice what we collected last year. A debt of gratitude to Jennie Williams and her many assistants to make it all happen. Also kudos to Kevin O'Shea and his Handy Helpers for dealing with not one but two sewer line blockages ahead of the sale. Note the pile of concrete pieces stacked along the driveway between the Fellowship Hall and the rental apartments. These (the concrete blocks) are free for everyone who wants them. All you need is transportation.

On a personal note, I have had about as much fun as I can stand. After submitting this report, I am packing up and heading for the White Mountains of Arizona near the New Mexico border to meet up with my high school mates for a week. The friendship has lasted for 70 years.

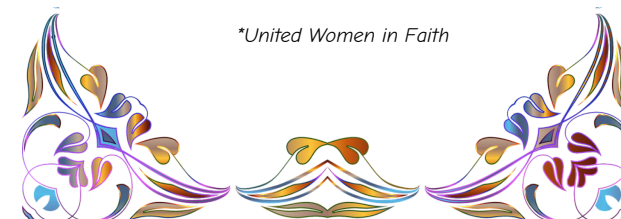

Hearing Enhancement Technology is Available

Hearing enhancement technology is available. We have a Hearing Loop System that works in the main sanctuary (not the balcony or side room). Hearing loop systems transmit sound from a microphone directly into listeners' hearing aids or cochlear implants, free from ambient or background noise. You may need to ask your provider if your hearing aid has a 'telecoil' or 't-coil', and have them program or activate it for you.

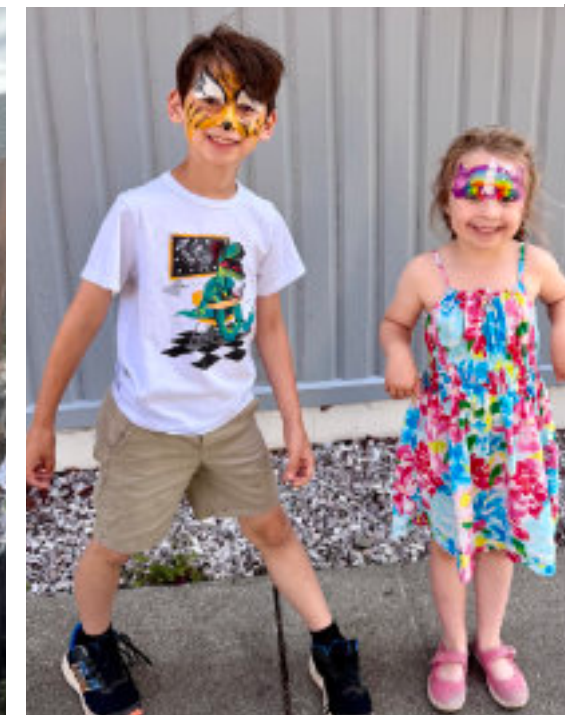

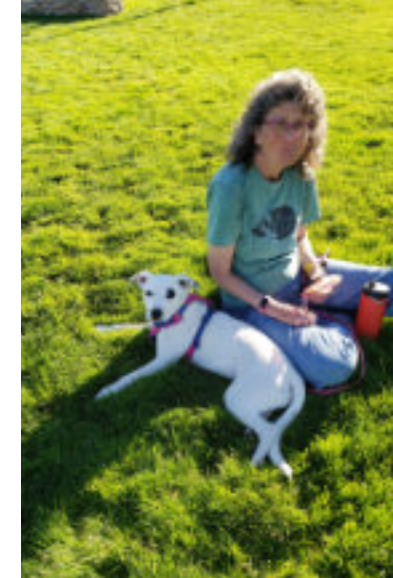
Please pray for healing and support for our Trinity family, friends, and family members.
