## SPOTLIGHT: TONYA BRINKELY

Tonya was born in Upland, California and moved out to the Salton Sea area when she was 2. She enjoyed the pleasures of growing up in the desert including riding off road vehicles, shooting, and fishing in the sea. She played basketball, volleyball and softball in high school and graduated Co-Salutatorian of her class of 18 graduating kids. She attended a small church and at the age of 16, she was baptized in the Salton Sea surrounded by friends from the church.

The day before her 18th birthday, she joined the Navy and headed to Florida for boot camp; attended school in Great Lakes, IL to become an electrician; and then to Hawaii for 3 years where she was stationed on the USS Arizona.

After her military service she returned to California and worked for the Morongo tribe until she found the First Presbyterian Church in San Bernardino. It was there that she began working as a child care provider for all ages but settled into the 4 year old age group. She began attending college to get a degree in Early Childhood education.

In 1999, she met her daughter's father and in 2001 she was blessed with the beautiful and talented Ariel. In 2003, the wildfires in San Bernardino claimed their house and they were forced to leave San Bernardino and head to Moreno Valley. After a brief employment as a repo agent, she

went back to child care with the Luiseno Tribe in San Jacinto. Tonya continued to attend college and had **now worked up to a Bachelor's Degree** in Education with an emphasis in Mild-Moderate Disabilities.



In July of 2008, her brother became very ill with Diabetic Ketoacidosis, she promised him that if he got out of the hospital she would move him to anywhere he wanted to go. He decided on Port Townsend. In November of 2008, Tonya, her brother, and Ariel packed up a U-haul truck and moved to Port Townsend. After

about 5 months getting acclimated to the new area she took a job as a child care provider at Caring Hands Day-care. After 1 year she was offered the opportunity to own the center and so she went into business with her best friend and opened The Learning Company Inc. Tonya completed her **Master's degree in 2010.**

One day, while surfing the net, she came across a post on Facebook looking for help at Trinity. She didn't pay much attention. Then a few months later she saw the post again and after a tug on her heart she notified Pastor Tonya and fell instantly in love with the amazing little white church, all of the wonderful people in it, and the kids. As many of you know, Tonya was recently diagnosed with breast cancer and has begun treatment for that. She feels very blessed to have Trinity be in her support circle.



## PASTOR'S LOG

The picture is from a few years ago of a trip I did with Miriam up Klahhane Ridge in the Olympic National Park. There are 33 switch backs on the way up the 1700 foot climb. When we were sitting at the top here in this photo, I thought about how there was no way that Miriam could have made it up without my help. In fact, there was one man on the way up who asked if I thought he would fit **into my pack so I could carry him.** “She’s lucky!”, he said.

I know that many people in our church are going through difficult times right now. There are many with sicknesses and horrible pain, some who are living with serious fears and worries, others who have been fighting for their lives, and those who have witnessed loved ones suffering or even dying. Getting up and going on with our lives can seem impossible with all of these realities stacked against us.

However, like Miriam, you have a Dad, your Heavenly Father, who desires to pick you up and carry you to new heights. Even in the midst of impossible realities, God is prepared to raise you up above the pains of life and lift you to improbable places in the midst of your pain. Yes, God wants to lift us all up to places of JOY, PEACE, HOPE, and LOVE despite the impossible and overwhelming circum-



stances that we face.

This is what the prophet, Isaiah, means when he writes,

*“Have you not known? Have you not heard? The Lord is the everlasting God, the Creator of the ends of the earth. He does not faint or grow weary...He gives power to the faint, and strengthens the powerless. Even youths will faint and be weary, and the young will fall exhausted; but those who wait for the Lord shall renew their strength, they shall mount up with wings like eagles, they shall run and not be weary, they shall walk and not faint.”*

-Isaiah 40 (selected verses)

Take some advice from a child, sit back and let God be your strength. Turn to God to pick you up and carry you through the difficult times. Wait on the Lord!

Doing this does not mean that you give up, rather it means that you look to your God in your weakness. It

means you depend on God through your church family. It means you take opportunities to crawl into the lap of God and simply **‘BE’ in God’s presence.** God will carry you through the difficult times, but we have to be willing to let God pick us up.

## Val James & Friends – Sing Jazz Favorites At Candlelight Concert

November's Candlelight Concert, Val James and her "Friends" will perform an array of favorite Jazz Standards from the music of the '30s, '40s by a multitude of composers such as the Gershwin, Cole Porter, and Antônio Carlos Jobim, along with songs made famous by such singers as Frank Sinatra, Ella Fitzgerald and Mel Tormé. This unique concert will be held at Trinity United Methodist Church on Thursday, November 17 at 7:00 pm.

Although James sang folk music during the 60's, she didn't start singing jazz until about 25 years ago. Her mother sang with Bing Crosby on the radio in the late 30's early 40's, and was a "ghost singer" for the movies. James says, *"I just can't get those beautiful songs out of my head. Some of my favorite tunes will include Our Love is Here to Stay, Girl From Ipanema, Shadow of Your Smile, Cheek to Cheek, and but Not For Me.*

She has performed both in Seattle and in the Port Townsend area since the early 80's. James was a regular for many years at The Upstage and was the producer of Jazz Gals, a jazz trio that showcased local female vocalists. She now is a frequent performer at The Cellar Door. Although she plays guitar herself, when it comes to jazz, she prefers to let the band back her up. She and her husband Mike have two jazz CDs along with two folk and singer songwriter CDs and are featured on 4 other Nautical CD's with other performers in Washington State. These CDs will be available for purchase at the Candlelight Concert.

James' "Friends" that provide musical accompaniment for her jazz concert include Mark Schechter - piano, Bruce Cannavaro - Bass, Tim Sheffel - drums, and Rex Rice - trombone. Jack Lambton will join the group on guitar. Pete Toyne had been James' guitarist for years until his passing.

All of James' supporting musicians come from musical backgrounds and many made careers with music.

Most notable is trombonist Rice who toured with the Jimmy Dorsey Orchestra and played with combos and big bands throughout the Pacific Northwest. He also played with the Everett Symphony for seven years. He continues to keep busy playing with the Bourbon Street All Stars, the Foggy Bottom Jazz Band, the Dukes of Dabob, the Chimacum Horns, Nostalgia and he is also a staff member of the North West Big Band Camp.

Pianist Mark Schechter has played piano since he was a diminutive little tyke. Despite all efforts by the cognoscenti to discourage him, he has persisted until this very day, regaling listeners with any music they would tolerate, from classical to rock 'n roll to jazz. Beware.

Cannavaro on bass, has played with dozens of different bands and different genres, but says the most important thing is that he just loves to make music with his friends. And James' new guitarist Lambton, is also new to the Port Townsend musical community but has played Jazz and Blues guitar in Austin and San Francisco.

All proceeds of this Candlelight Concert of Jazz Favorites will benefit the Jefferson County National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI). NAMI is a non-profit, grassroots self-help, support and advocacy organization for people with severe and persistent mental illnesses, and their family members and friends. **The concert will be performed at Port Townsend's oldest Victorian Church, Trinity United Methodist Church, 609 Taylor Street, across from the Community Center, Uptown. Doors open at 6:30 PM, - admission is by a suggested \$10 donation (children admitted free). Refreshments will be served following the performance. ## FINANCE COMMITTEE

If you heard my Stewardship Moment in October, this might sound familiar. It is still pertinent as it is in regards to our **Operating fund's current** health. This account pays the salaries and day to day expenses, like you have at home. **The finance committees' intention is to be very** transparent with the financial information and you can always see the most current Financial Reports posted downstairs. But what you *can't easily* see is how our income and expenses fluctuate month to month.

I am delighted to say that I have seen many Estimate of Giving cards come in already. Thank you all so much for getting those purple papers back into us. You *do not need* to be a member yet to participate in that process. Unfortunately, I cannot bring you *only* good news today. The committee has been noticing a trend in decreased giving for the last couple of months, which will probably cause us to have to dip into our new and *limited* Reserve Account to supplement our Operating Account in January. At the end of September *last year* our income was at \$107,000, but this year we were only at \$103,000. **That's a \$4000 difference and doesn't account for the \$11,000 increase** in the 2016 budget. We already know that, for starters, our *insurance* and *apportionment* costs are going up in 2017, so the budget will likely increase again.

Now, we can account for a few thousand dollars that are yet to come in, so we may just have a two to three-thousand-dollar **shortfall, at the year's end**. But in trying to decipher where the losses were coming from, the *importance* of the Estimate of Giving cards, *and* offerings coming in with names on them, became very clear.

If you pledge but put cash in the plate without your name, not only do you not get credit for tax purposes at the end of the year, but Lynn is not able to credit against your pledged amount. So, your end of the year giving record will show a balance due. If you **don't** turn in an Estimate of Giving card but **do** give **financially to the church, we don't know what to** anticipate for budgeting purposes *and* **we don't know how** to adjust the budget if you leave. *In other words*, because only 35 households turned in E. of G. cards last year *and* not everyone includes their name with their offering, it is impossible to know where the loss is coming from.

Pastor Tony is quick to assume responsibility, as the income decrease was more notable in the months following his coming out, when 12 or so members left us. But here is what I know: **we've also had 3 households** move, 1 death and 2 members leave to serve the P.H. church. **Plus, we've been blessed with 9** new members *and* some congregants are even more committed and involved because of his announcement.

I know that we have gained much more than we've lost in having Tony come back to us in January, during one of his darkest moments. Not only do we get the same learned, creative and energetic Tony we had before but now we also get a joyful, unburdened and unveiled Pastor and friend. As individuals, we are blessed with the opportunity to *witness and be inspired* by his *authenticity and vulnerability*. As a congregation, we have the gifts of compassion and acceptance to share with people in this community. Many who may have been previously hurt by the way they or their loves were treated by another church. They may just need an invitation.

**And now I invite you, if you haven't already, to** fill out a E. of G. card and turn it in, knowing that your gifts will be used wisely to further the mission of this church. Thank you!





## TRAVELS WITH ERNIE

From then on finding good places to eat was part of the adventure. One of our best lunches was at a small gas station/café/general store run by a very cheerful chatty woman. After Buffalo, we began to see antelope along the road and looked for the ones with horns, also seeing a bull elk standing by the road eyeing the cars peacefully.

After the big states of Montana and Wyoming, we zipped through South Dakota, Maryland, and West Virginia to Virginia. Ernie thought he knew how to get to Susie's house, but the roads had been changed and some sort of institution had been built on one, so we had to call for directions and Susie came to find us and lead us in. The next morning some neighbors came over to help unload the car and set up the table. Susie was delighted with it. It really is beautiful! We spent some happy days with Susie, then drove to Pennsylvania, where a cousin of Ernie's was having a Pig Roast. That turned out to be a huge event with wonderful food and very nice people.

Then we headed West for a speedy trip home, unburdened by the table. I'm glad I got to go!


