SPOTLIGHT: ERIC INCOY

Eric (born Herico P. Incoy) has never been married and has no kids of his own, except for the "blessing addition of Miriam and Lydia" in his life. He has a dog named Rambo. As you know, Eric is engaged to Pastor Tony. They met on 29 May 2016 and hiked at Mount Zion – Olympic National Forest.

Eric was born in the Philippines in a town called Naic, Cavite, which is a little over an hour south of Manila. His father, Jose L. Incoy, was a tricycle driver and World War II Veteran. He passed away on 10 September 2000. His mother, Rosario P. Incoy, is a retired Elementary School teacher who specialized in Mathematics. She currently resides in the Philippines alongside Eric's sister (his eldest sibling) and older brother. Eric is the middle child of five siblings with two younger brothers who are also in the U.S. Navy.

His mother, two younger brothers and he moved from the Philippines to Long Beach, CA when he was 14. Eric graduated from David Starr Jordan High School when he was 17, and **joined the Navy with his parents' consent.** He enlisted in the Navy as a Hospital Corpsman (HM) on 30 July 1998 and will be retiring with 20 years of service on 31 July 2018.

Eric went to boot camp and HM A-School in Great Lakes, IL; Field Medical Training Battalion in Camp Pendleton, CA; then first duty station at Naval Medical Center San Diego, CA. Other previous commands are U.S.



Naval Hospital Guam, 2nd Marine Logistics Group (MLG) – Camp Lejeune, NC, 2nd Dental Battalion – Camp Lejeune, NC, and his current command is the Naval Hospital Bremerton, WA. He deployed to Kuwait for Expeditionary Medical Facility – Detachment Charlie from August 2006 to March 2007, and Iraq with Combat Logistics Regiment 27/2nd MLG Forward from January to December 2009 in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom.

Eric's first job was via a Summer Youth Employment Program working in a State Park for a couple of summers. He listens to all kinds of music ranging from Pop, Rock, R&B, Hip-Hop, Country and Indie/Folk. He is currently listening to P!nk, Fergie, Demi Lovato, AJR, Sam Smith, Taylor Swift, Kelly Clarkson, Kendrick Lamar, Coldplay, One Republic, Florence and the Machine. Some of his favorite movies are Forrest Gump, The Matrix, The Lord of the Rings and The

PASTOR'S LOG

Meeet Walter. When Trinity made the decision to go to Swaziland to work at the boys orphanage in 2014 I had no idea that God would lead our church down a path that would include a young man with albinism seeking asylum from ruthless murderers. However, God is always at work behind the scenes bringing all things together for the good of those who love God.

In parts of Africa those with albinism are still captured and killed by those who believe that their body parts have magical qualities. It is a terrifying and barbaric practice. Walter was threatened in his town by some of these people, and his mother sent him to live at the boys orphanage, where we were working, for his safety. When we learned of his story we began talking to the church leaders of St. Paul's Methodist in Manzini who oversee the orphanage. They thought that bringing Walter to the USA to apply for asylum would be good. They agreed that it was, and so when we returned one of the members of the mission team, Alicea, began investigating how to make this happen.

Three weeks ago her search led her to a man in Canada who has contacts at the United Nations and we had a conference call with him. He promised to offer all the resources that they had to make this happen, but told us that Walter really needed to be the one to make this decision. Last week, Rev. Charlie (the minister from the South African Methodist Church), traveled to Swaziland to speak with Walter. Walter and his mother agreed that to keep him safe and to offer him a life of hope, it was in his best interest to come to the USA to seek asylum. We have another conference call with people from the United Nations this week, and they will walk with us through this process.

The first step is to get Walter on US soil. He can not apply for asylum until he is here. This will begin in Swaziland with him getting his passport and applying for a tourist visa. He will apply for the visa as a resident from the orphanage who is coming to visit the church that has been twice to renovate their building. He will come as a guest of Trinity United Methodist Church and the greater United Methodist Church. This should ensure his ability to get here on a tourist visa. Once here, he can apply for asylum and begin receiving all the support that is available. We will proba-



bly house him temporarily during this time, but whether he remains a resident of Port Townsend or not is unknown. There is also no gurantee that his request for asylum will be granted, but asylum for those with albinism in these situations usually is granted.

You can help with this work of God by donating financially, any size gift would help. Most importantly is to be be praying for this situation and asking God to guide us in this process, opening doors for Walter that need to be opened. Thank you Trinity for all your interest in this endeavor. We are working together to transform this young mans world. God is good, and you all are examples of God's goodness!

“David Michael & Friends - Potpourri”

November Candlelight Concert

Strings meet winds for the November Candlelight Concert at Trinity United Methodist Church featuring harpist David Michael and an array of his exceptionally talented friends. This performance will be held on Thursday, November 16 at 7:00pm. Michael, a longtime resident of Port Townsend, will perform on a 38-string Neo-Celtic harp and will be accompanied by special guests including Ann Lindquist on flutes, Maryann Tapiro on cello, **Paul Becker on clarinet and Michael’s wife Dari Lewis on bowed psaltery.** They will present a rich and diverse program of original music and free-form improvisation.

David Michael is an eclectic composer, producer, international performer and a master of improvisation who has produced 24 CDs of original music—mostly released on his independent label, Purnima Productions. His music has been featured on syndicated radio shows, cable & network television and in nature films. He is well known for his many years performing on Washington State Ferries and has also toured Europe, performing in castles, cultural centers and in the walking streets of Scandinavia. Inspired by natural beauty, Michael has a passion for seeking the common ground between diverse styles of music.

Ann Lindquist plays a plethora of flutes including concert, alto, bass and contrabass and Native American triple flutes. She is well known for major performance tours with Windham Hill artist, pianist, Scott Cossu since 1998 and has also shared stages with such luminaries as Will Ackerman, Susan Osborne and Nancy Rumbel. Her performances have taken her to a multitude of festivals including performances at the Washington State Governor’s Mansion, the Capital Building, and Washington State Performing Arts Center in Olympia, Alaska, Oregon, Hawaii and beyond.

Cellist, Maryann Tapiro moved to Port Townsend

last December after living in the Seattle area for decades. She performed for years as principal cellist for Orchestra Seattle under George Shangrow, conductor. She also played with the Tacoma Symphony, Bellevue Philharmonic and subbed for the PNW Ballet and NW Chamber Orchestra. She has worked with Linda Ronstadt, K.D. Lang, David Lanz, and Natalie Cole and is a founding member of Trio Classique. Tapiro has now delved into improvisation on electric and acoustic cello, playing kirtan music with world-renowned chanter, Gina Sala. She is currently the principal cellist for the Port Townsend Community Orchestra. She will soon be performing the Mozart Requiem and other fine works in the upcoming RainShadow Chorale performance in mid-November.

Clarinetist, Paul Becker has collaborated musically with David Michael since 1990 and has made **guest appearances on many of Michael’s CDs, playing clarinets and recorders.** He is also well known in Port Townsend as a guitarist and a vocalist for ten years with Wild Rose Chorale. He currently sings bass with RainShadow Chorale.

Dari Lewis is a composer, recording artist and multi-instrumentalist who joined her husband, David Michael, playing bowed psaltery on a tour in Europe where the duo performed in castles and in the walking streets of Denmark and Sweden. Her music was featured by CNN International for a program about Copenhagen.

The concert will be performed at Port Townsend’s oldest Victorian Church, Trinity United Methodist Church, 609 Taylor Street, across from the Community Center, Uptown. Doors open at 6:00 PM, – admission is by a suggested \$10 donation (children admitted free). Refreshments will be served following the performance. TRUSTEES' REPORT—SPRING CLEANING IN OCTOBER

I believe in equality; character says a lot about a person, not their gender/sexual orientation, race and religion."

After retiring from the military, Eric is looking forward to starting a new chapter of his life by going to school and furthering his education. Meeting Tony brought him to Port Townsend and Trinity. He still currently lives in Bremerton and appreciates living close(ish) to Tony, the love of his life, who, along with his family and the loving people of Trinity, help to keep him coming back to Port Townsend.

Eric likes to spend his spare time hiking, running, traveling/road trips, concerts, watching TV/movies and catching up on sleep. Currently he is involved with the trail clean-up volunteer at Newberry Hill Heritage Park in Silverdale. The Trinity programs Eric is involved with (or will be involved with soon) are the Swaziland Mission Trip and learning/ **helping the undisputed "Jill-of-all-trades", Marlene, with the** community outreach program.
